2. Sponsorships are non-refundable and non-transferable. In the event that an alpaca moves to a new farm or passes away, you will be notified and offered an alternate alpaca for the remainder of your sponsorship period.

FAQ's

Before you make your decision, we ask that you please read the following FAQ's.

So, does it mean we own the alpaca or llama?

Unfortunately, not. Those that choose to sponsor do not have any ownership rights to their alpaca/llama. The money you spend on the animal is instead put towards the upkeep of them, ensuring they have the best of everything available to them.

Is it possible to take the animal off of the property to show friends and family?

Again, no. Some are more socialable than other.

How often can I visit my alpaca?

• The package contains one-time paid admission for two to visit the farm. Tours can be prebooked online or by calling 803-480-3750. We ask that you plan your visit in advance and not during our public events. You are welcome to call us to schedule other times if we are available. Please note that the months of May to August are very busy with shows, shearing, and outside events. Visitors under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

What if something happens to my alpaca/llama throughout the year?

Although we certainly don't wish to think about such things, if something should happen to your alpaca/llama we will happily allow you to choose another to sponsor.

Will I be able to handle my alpaca/llama?

Due to safety issues, you will not be allowed to handle. Not all are extremely social. Please see their bios for more details.

Picking your alpaca: Check the bios attached. We would also like to remind people that even though the yearlings of the herd are an obvious favorite to adopt as they are so cute and cuddly, they will always tend to be on the shy side and reluctant to leave their mothers side. This means that if you come on site to visit, it will be more observation from a distance. In addition, they will not beginning eat from your hand til around 5 months old. Past a year, how they interact with humans in general will really depend on their personalities and we do try and highlight which ones are more receptive to human interaction in their bios. It's best to keep in mind that just like people, every alpaca and llama is different. Some are more cautious around humans while others are happy to come right up for a quick cuddle and kiss.

Finalizing your sponsorship: Once you have picked your alpaca/llama, complete the registration to Alicia@cppastures.com. Once this is done, a Square invoice will be sent. We will send you all the goodies that come with your sponsorship and set up a time for your virtual call.
